



PSLLT 2025: Poster presentation

A poster is a snapshot of your work, displayed mostly via graphs, photos, diagrams and a small amount of text. The presentation consists of affixing the poster to a poster board, with the author in attendance answering questions posed by colleagues.

General information

- The poster board will be 4 feet (1.2 m) tall by 6 feet (1.8 m) wide. You should produce a SMALLER poster.
- A board and thumbtacks/pushpins will be provided for mounting the posters.
- Plan a 2-minute (maximum) informal oral presentation of your study in case you are asked to “walk through” it.
- The author/s must remain by their poster board for the duration of the entire session.
- If you plan to distribute handouts, bring approximately 50 copies.

Suggestions

- The title of the study, list of authors, and their institutions should be clearly shown at the top of your poster.
- If appropriate, design your poster around the standard *Introduction, Literature Review, Method, Results, Discussion, and Implications/Conclusions* headings.
- Make sure that your poster has a *visual* story to tell, but remember that most people will only read bits of it. Be selective and think of a poster as a conversation starter and a (visual) summary of your work.
- Your poster should draw people towards it: it should be eye-catching. Consequently, avoid overloading your poster with text. Instead, use graphs, tables, charts, photos, etc.
- Poster material should be well labeled and legible/visible from a distance of 1–2 metres away. Major headings should be bold or in a larger font (or both).
- Use a large font size, preferably on non-glossy paper.
- Avoid ALL CAPS for long text.
- If you are unable to print one large poster sheet or to travel easily with a large printed poster, feel free to create your poster from several smaller printed panels.
